Headwaters Trail Expansion

Portage Park District received the Clean Ohio Trails Fund grant to continue Headwaters Trail between Asbury Road and State Route 700 in Hiram Township. The project includes acquisition of nine acres, design, and construction of one mile of new trail to connect the existing seven miles of trail which runs from Garrettsville to Mantua Village. The park district needs an additional \$14,000 to complete the project.

The Crestwood Lions club donated \$500 to Mantua Village for the purchase of a portable ice skating rink. The rink will be on the site of the volleyball court in Buchert Park and will be open to the public during daylight hours.

Image is everything. Make use of the tools we provide to enhance your image.


Uniting Sister Cities

Mantua residents Hank and Mary Cabot's trip to Italy wouldn't be complete without a visit to the cities of Mantua and Ravenna.

In honor of our Chamber's first anniversary, the Cabots laid the groundwork for a relationship between the officials of Mantua, Italy and our own Mantua, Ohio. With the help of Paulette Nichols and other Chamber members, the Cabots presented the Deputy Mayor of Mantua, Italy with gifts including a key to the Village of Mantua, Ohio; pictures of our area; a book on the history of our area by Norm Park of the Historical Society; and Maple Syrup from Goodell Farms.

Despite the language barrier, within an hour of arriving in the city of Mantua, Italy (pronounced Man-too-Ah), the officials there pulled together a small press conference with the Deputy Mayor, a translator, the Cabots, and the media for a gift-exchange ceremony.

The Cabots returned with a coffee-table book about Mantua (also spelled and pronounced Mantova); maps of the city; a calendar with pictures of the walled city, surrounded by lakes; an emblem of the city; brochures; and a book about the other eight cities in the world named after Mantua, Italy, written in Mantua, Cuba (the Crestwood High Spanish club will translate). Thanks to the Cabots, the Mantua-Shalersville Chamber of Commerce now has an alliance with Mantua on the other side of the globe.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT



What Lies Beneath

We're sitting on a natural resource that makes road and building construction affordable in Northeast Ohio. Extraction of sand and gravel is a key industry to our area. It induces many other industries that stimulate the economy. Think of all the truck drivers, repairmen, fuel suppliers, construction workers...and where they spend their money...restaurants, convenience stores, gas stations, banks...

Because transportation is the biggest factor in the price of aggregates, Portage County benefits from having an ample supply nearby. If not available in our area, the cost would triple. We would have to pay more in taxes or see fewer paved roads.

At the Chamber's November meeting, Larry Kotkowski of **Lakeside Sand & Gravel** explained the business that his family has operated since 1954. The family farmed before brothers Harry and Henry began extracting sand and gravel. Currently Larry, Alan, and Ronald own and operate the business, which is located in Shalersville Township.

The company has come a long way in 50 years. Shown below is the original dredger, used until the 1970's and recently restored, along with the dredger currently used. The new machine, running on two diesel engines, scoops up 10 tons of aggregate on each pass, from below 30-40 feet of water. Each scoop contains sand, stones, and rocks of all sizes. The product is loaded into a dump truck which holds 55-60 tons, then moved to a pile where it dries.

Large rocks are a popular item for landscaping, so they are kept intact, while smaller 4-5" rocks go to the jaw crusher to be broken into smaller pieces.
Gravel less than 1.25" then goes to the wash plant, while rocks go to a second crusher. Soft rocks are pulverized into sand and shakers screen it. A sand classifier



separates different granule sizes so it can later be blended, according to computer specs, for the product it will become. For example, concrete and asphalt are made from different "recipes;" 85% of concrete is sand and gravel, while asphalt contains 95%. Among other products, Lakeside's 24 employees supply granite for road construction and the base for driveways; #57s (the most popular) for asphalt, driveways, and septic; and #8 pea gravel for the surface coat of asphalt.

The average home requires 106 ton of aggregate to build (homes with septic systems require twice that much or more). The average new school or hospital requires 15,000 ton. A 4-lane highway uses 85,000 ton per mile. Each day, Lakeside loads 100-150 trucks for delivery to construction sites throughout Northeast Ohio.

Even while extracting materials from the earth, sand and gravel companies work to reclaim the areas. Digging may occur on one side of a lake, while a bulldozer pushes overburden (dirt found just below top soil), preparing it to be graded and planted with grass and trees. The industry is carefully scrutinized by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, which regulates digging and reclamation. In addition, mining companies must insure land at \$1000 per acre for reclamation of abandoned mines (usually coal mines).

The next time you get stuck behind a gravel truck when you're in a hurry or are delayed by road construction, think about all the work that went into producing the aggregate and how it ultimately makes our lives comfortable.

Soap Box Derby to Return

Joe Hull, the new President of the Portage County Soap Box Derby, visited the November Chamber meeting to present a plaque in appreciation of members' support during the 2003 season.



Once again, the Portage County race will be held on the High Street hill, near the Mantua Village police station. The date is set for Saturday, June 19, 2004. Volunteers and racers are needed. Watch for notices about workshops and events.
